This group is developing and planning a signature fund-raising event – a celebrity waiter dinner – for Court Appointed Special Advocates (CASA). The event will help to drive the funds required to provide volunteers for as many children as possible in the area.

CASA represents abused and neglected children while their cases move through the legal and social services systems. CASA volunteers are appointed by judges to watch over and advocate for the best interests of these children. Volunteers follow each case closely

until the child is placed in a safe, permanent home. For many abused children in the Green Bay area, their CASA volunteer may be the one reliable adult presence in their lives.

Last year, CASA of Brown County supported 246 children in need with their 124 volunteers.

Lighting the Way to the Kroc

The City of Green Bay is working to ensure easy access to the new Salvation Army Ray and Joan Kroc Corps Community Center, a facility for the low-income neighborhoods that surround the area. The city recognized an excellent opportunity to connect Imperial Lane – a low-income, high crime and high density multi-family street – directly to the center with a lighted trail. The trail, slated to span 1,200 feet, will build upon the efforts of the community policing program to help improve the conditions of this area.

The group's goal is to ultimately install 17 street lights and eight security cameras along the trail. They are a few weeks away from launching their fund-raising efforts with a professional video produced by Launch Film visually highlighting the project plans for

potential donors. Beyond the funding, trail construction and the installation of lights and cameras will begin in summer for 2012.
